**CALL TO ORDER AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE**

President Allen called the meeting to order at 11:47 a.m. and asked Regional Council Mark

Henderson, Gardena, RC District 28, to lead the pledge of allegiance.

Ruben Duran, Board Counsel, noted that Mayor Frank Navarro, RC District 6, would be participating through an accommodation under the Americans with Disabilities Act.

### **PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD**

President Allen opened the Public Comment Period for persons to comment on any matter pertinent to SCAG's jurisdiction that were not listed on the agenda.

Board Counsel Duran acknowledged there were no written public comments received.

Seeing no public comment speakers for items not listed on the agenda, President Allen closed the Public Comment Period.

### **REVIEW AND PRIORITIZE AGENDA ITEMS**

There was no prioritization of agenda items.

### **CHAIR'S REPORT**

David J. Shapiro, Community, Economic, and Human Development Committee (CEHD) Chair, reported the CEHD Committee held elections for its next Chair and Vice Chair. He announced that Rocky Rhodes had been selected as Chair and Jeff Wood as Vice Chair. He also reported that the Committee approved \$20 million in REAP 2.0 Notice of Funding Availability awards for five projects, as well as the LDX Guiding Principles and Process Overview. He indicated that the Committee also received two informational presentations. The first, presented by Dr. Kevin Kane, SCAG's Planning Supervisor of Demographics and Growth Vision, provided an overview of the Connect SoCal 2050 County and Regional Growth Forecast, which serves as a technical foundation for policy development within the Regional Transportation Plan/Sustainable Communities Strategy (RTP/SCS) and ensures planning efforts reflect real-world trends. This was followed by a presentation from Camille Guiriba on the vision, goals, and policy review for Connect SoCal 2050, offering a refresher on policies from the previous RTP/SCS and laying the groundwork for future discussions on refining the policy framework for the next Connect SoCal plan. He also extended his sincere thanks to the committee members for the opportunity to serve as Chair of the CEHD Committee over the past two years.

There were no comments on the CEHD Chair report.

Rick Denison, Energy and Environment Committee (EEC) Chair, reported that the EEC meeting included four informational items. First, the Committee received an overview of the Connect SoCal

2050 Vision, Goals, and Policy Review. He indicated it was followed by a presentation on SCAG's newly released Regional Resilience Toolkit, which provides jurisdictions with information, best practices, and resources to help integrate resilience into planning and implementation efforts. He reported that the Committee then heard an overview of the LA County Heat Action Plan, which outlines strategies to reduce vulnerability to extreme heat both indoors and outdoors and to strengthen preparedness for severe heat events. To conclude the informational items, he reported that the nonprofit Amigos de Los Rios presented its work on planning, funding, and implementing multi-benefit schoolyard retrofits throughout LA County that reduce extreme heat, improve stormwater capture and filtration, and create healthier and cooler spaces for children to learn and play. He noted that the meeting also included the election of the Chair and Vice Chair, and reported that he was re-elected as Chair and Daniel Ramos was re-elected as Vice Chair.

There were no comments on the EEC Chair report.

Mike T. Judge, Transportation Committee (TC) Chair, reported that the TC reappointed him as Chair and Thomas Wong as Vice Chair for another one-year term. He reported that the Committee approved the 2027 Active Transportation Program Regional Guidelines, ensuring \$129 million is available through the MPO component of ATP Cycle 8. He also noted that the Committee also approved recommended applicants for the Last Mile Freight Rebate Program to position the region to receive EPA Invest Clean funding for zero- and near-zero-emission truck deployment and supporting infrastructure. He indicated that two informational updates were provided: an update on SCAG's curb space management program, including pilot activities in preparation for upcoming regional mega-events, and an update on the Connect SoCal 2050 Vision, Goals, and Policy Review. He noted that additional discussion on Connect SoCal 2050 was anticipated at the April Joint Policy Committee meeting.

There were no comments on the TC Chair report.

### **ACTION ITEM**

#### 1. Approval of the Fiscal Year 2026-27 Draft Comprehensive Budget

Ruben Duran, Board Counsel, stated that before acting on this item, the Brown Act required that they orally report a summary of any recommendations for final action on the salaries, salary schedules, or fringe benefits of agency executives. He indicated that this item included SCAG's updated salary schedule, which increases the salary range for eight executive classifications. He stated that this action updates the ranges only and does not set or change any individual executive's current salary, and it includes no changes to fringe benefits. He stated that the specific ranges were shown in the staff report for this item. He indicated that this oral report was being provided as part of their draft budget. He indicated that they would also provide the required oral

summary again immediately before the Regional Council takes final action at its meeting at the General Assembly in May.

Cindy Geraldo, Chief Financial Officer, presented the FY 2026–27 Draft Comprehensive Budget totaling approximately \$269 million, reflecting a \$200 million (43%) decrease due to the natural spend-down of major one-time grant programs, including REAP 2021, the Last Mile Freight Program, and several federal programs. She noted that approximately \$263.5 million (98%) supports the Overall Work Program, with significant pass-through and technical assistance funding, including \$50 million for the INVEST CLEAN Rebate Program, \$40 million for REAP initiatives, and \$11 million for Sustainable Communities and Safe Streets for All efforts. She reported that the Consultants category totaled \$61 million for regional planning activities, and the Salaries and Benefits budget totaled \$50.3 million, reflecting a net reduction of four positions. She requested approval of updated salary ranges following a total rewards study. She reported that the Indirect Cost Budget totaled \$40.3 million, including \$5.7 million for SCAG’s new ERP system, with year-over-year indirect costs decreasing after excluding this one-time expense. She noted that the General Fund Budget totaled \$3.3 million, funded primarily by a CPI-adjusted (3.01%) Membership Assessment. She recommended that the Regional Council approve the FY 2026–27 Draft Comprehensive Budget, authorize release of the Draft Overall Work Program for a 30-day public comment period, and approve the General Fund Budget and Membership Assessment for transmittal.

A MOTION was made (Ramos) to recommend that the Regional Council: 1) Approve the Fiscal Year 2026-27 Draft Comprehensive Budget in the amount of \$269,189,485; 2) Authorize the release of the FY 2026-27 Draft Overall Work Program (OWP) to initiate the 30-day public comment period; and 3) Approve the FY 2026-27 General Fund Budget and Membership Assessment and transmit to the General Assembly. Motion was SECONDED (Shapiro) and passed by the following votes:

### INFORMATION ITEM

#### 13. Resilience Resolution Update

Kome Ajise, Executive Director, reported that the meeting would focus on providing an update on their work under the Resilience Resolution, which the Regional Council approved in June 2025. He stated that following the devastating Eaton and Palisades wildfires, they convened a regional discussion on rebuilding, recovery, and resilience through a Joint Policy Committee, followed by more detailed conversations within each of our three policy committees. He indicated this led to the Regional Council's adoption of the Resilience Resolution, outlining strategies to strengthen resilience across the region. Since then, he noted that staff have been actively advancing those strategies, and at this meeting they would present an update on the progress made over the past year, including a spotlight on one of the key efforts underway. He indicated that the update would also include presentations from Larry Kosmont, CEO of Kosmont Companies; Julia Orozco, from the Office of Los Angeles County Supervisor Lindsey Horvath; and Craig Bullock, from the Office of Los Angeles City Councilmember Traci Park. He introduced SCAG Deputy Director of Planning and Land Use Elizabeth Carvajal to provide a presentation.

Elizabeth Carvajal, Deputy Director of Land Use, provided an update on progress made since the adoption of SCAG's Resilience Resolution in June 2023. She noted the devastating wildfires in Los Angeles city and county that prompted SCAG to support affected communities and advance regional resilience planning. She outlined the release of the new Resilience Toolkit, which offers guidance on assessing vulnerabilities, developing plans and policies, funding strategies, implementation, and disaster recovery. She reported ongoing work to establish a tax increment financing (TIF) program, including resources for jurisdictions, information on climate resilience districts, and six pilot feasibility studies. She also highlighted a \$3.8 million REAP 2.0 grant provided to Los Angeles County to support an affordable ADU program for fire-impacted areas, offering \$100,000 grants per homeowner. Finally, she summarized the Disaster Recovery District Feasibility Study conducted with Kosmont Companies for Pacific Palisades and the unincorporated Santa Monica Mountains, introducing guest speakers who would further discuss TIF, county recovery efforts, and the City of Los Angeles' work.

Larry Kosmont, CEO of Kosmont Companies, explained that climate resilience districts (CRDs) represent the newest form of tax-increment districts implemented after the end of redevelopment and serve as a strong tool for addressing resilience, infrastructure, and insurance challenges across urban, suburban, and rural communities. He noted the severe impacts of recent disasters, particularly in the Santa Monica Mountains and Pacific Palisades, where many homeowners face significant barriers to rebuilding. He emphasized that SCAG's early technical support allowed the city and county to evaluate tax-increment financing options quickly, which are essential for installing infrastructure and enabling private investment, the foundation of long-term recovery. He outlined how Disaster Recovery Districts (DRDs) capture post-disaster property value increases to fund infrastructure and accelerate rebuilding, highlighting current progress in both the county and the City of Los Angeles. He concluded by stressing the need for early funding from sources such as philanthropy and state programs, commending SCAG's leadership and noting that DRDs provide a critical pathway to timely infrastructure restoration and recovery.

Julia Orozco, from the Office of Los Angeles County Supervisor Lindsey Horvath, thanked SCAG and its partners for their rapid assistance following the unprecedented Palisades and Eaton fires, noting that the scale of devastation required immediate action despite bureaucratic challenges. She explained that multiple unincorporated communities in the Santa Monica Mountains were heavily affected and that assumptions about state and federal disaster aid had not yet materialized, requiring jurisdictions to pursue flexible and innovative recovery strategies, including exploration of a Disaster Recovery Financing District. She emphasized the need to combat misinformation, support traumatized communities, and shift from immediate relief to major infrastructure investments. She indicated that the county's response has included legislative advocacy, establishment of a Blue-Ribbon Commission on Climate Action and Fire Safe Recovery, expedited permitting efforts, and collaboration with SCAG on recovery financing. She also highlighted the importance of improved emergency preparedness, governance reforms under Measure G, and the creation of a Rebuilding Authority to strengthen coordination and leadership. She concluded by thanking SCAG for its continued partnership and support throughout the recovery process.

Craig Bullock, from the Office of Los Angeles City Councilmember Traci Park, thanked SCAG for its early support in launching the tax increment financing (TIF) effort critical to long-term fire recovery. He noted the extensive damage in the Pacific Palisades, including the loss of 358 mobile homes, some of the area's most affordable housing, and thousands of additional homes, rental units, and community facilities. He outlined the city's rapid debris removal and utility restoration, while acknowledging ongoing challenges, including slope instability and long-neglected infrastructure needs. He described the district's work to preserve key historic structures and emphasized that a funded recovery is essential. He reported that despite initial setbacks in the City's Budget and Finance Committee, the TIF feasibility study was now moving forward, and he stressed the importance of continued education and outreach to build support for a financing strategy that will

enable meaningful recovery. He concluded by expressing appreciation for SCAG's ongoing assistance.

Regional Council Member Steve Tye, Diamond Bar, RC District 37, expressed frustration that despite early promises of waived permits and a fast-rebuilding process, almost nothing had been accomplished in fourteen months and very few homes had been rebuilt. He voiced concerns about property acquisition by large firms and the high percentage of affected residents who were seniors, calling the situation unmanageable. While local officials have tried to help, he questioned what they can realistically do alone and emphasized the urgency of acting before Sacramento slows progress further.

Mr. Kosmont responded that early funding was essential because expedited permits mean little without roads, utilities, and other infrastructure. He stated that rebuilding required establishing local districts to retain revenue, securing early state and philanthropic funding, and addressing infrastructure before tackling insurance issues. He stressed that the communities must unite, push Sacramento and federal partners, and obtain upfront funding to repair infrastructure and get homes rebuilt, concluding that they must "march on Sacramento" to make it happen.

Regional Council Member David Shapiro, Calabasas, RC District 44, expressed appreciation for the reports. He emphasized that Malibu, along with Calabasas, Hidden Hills, Westlake, and Agoura were part of his district, and the tragedies caused by the Eaton and Palisades fires had been devastating and unimaginable for so many residents. He emphasized that the discussion highlighted important opportunities to prepare for future emergencies that every district will face, whether fire, earthquake, or flood, and stressed the value of developing proactive plans in partnership with SCAG and other agencies. He closed by thanking everyone for their work.

## **BUSINESS REPORT**

Regional Council Member Lucy Dunn stated her report was on page 204 of the agenda packet. She thanked Paul Granillo for providing an economic update. She shared a few key insights from the March 3 OC Forum. According to CSUF's Dr. Mira Farka, the economy was holding steady for now, though uncertainties remain given global conflict, soft job growth, ongoing tariff impacts, and widening income inequality. She indicated that UCI survey data showed workforce housing and affordability as Orange County's top concerns, while overall sentiment about the county remained positive. She also reported attending a screening of Bright Harvest, a documentary on Caltech's advancements in space-based solar energy, and noted a future showing on March 31 at the Irvine Barclay Theatre. Finally, she reported that she attended the inaugural meeting of the Technical Advisory Group for the development of SCAG's Connect SoCal plan.

## **PRESIDENT'S REPORT**

President Allen announced that West Hollywood City Councilmember Chelsea Byers was elected to represent Regional Council District 41 and would also serve on the Community, Economic, and Human Development Committee. She also reported participating in Mobility21's Sacramento advocacy trip with SCAG leadership, meeting with legislators and state officials, including California Transportation Secretary Toks Omishakin, to discuss regional transportation priorities and advocate for SB 375 reforms. She invited members to the California Association of Councils of Governments' 2026 Regional Leadership Forum in Long Beach on March 9–11. She also noted that April meetings had been rescheduled to the second Thursday due to Passover, with no meetings of the Energy and Environment Committee or the CEHD Committee that month. She reported that there would be a Special Transportation Committee on April 9 that would meet at 9:00 a.m., followed by the Joint Policy Committee at 10:00 a.m., and the Regional Council at 11:45 a.m.

## **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

Executive Director Ajise thanked staff and guest speakers for the regional resilience presentation and announced the release of SCAG's Regional Resilience Toolkit, now available via the Spotlight newsletter and the SCAG website. He reported progress on SB 375 modernization through the introduction of SB 1087 and highlighted continued support for AB 2002 to codify the REAP program. He provided an update on REAP 2.0 implementation, including quarterly progress reporting and the Regional Council's approval of \$20 million for the Lasting Affordability Program. He also noted the EPA's recent repeal of the 2009 Greenhouse Gas Endangerment Finding and stated that SCAG was evaluating potential regional impacts while California's GHG reduction framework remained in effect. He reported that the Greenprint tool was entering final development and was expected to be released in June following beta testing. Lastly, he reported that the Federal Transit Administration recently released details on the allocation of \$100 million authorized by Congress for the 11 FIFA World Cup host cities. He noted that the Los Angeles–Long Beach–Anaheim Urbanized Area will receive approximately \$9.6 million and that these funds were intended to support transit services for World Cup events at SoFi Stadium. He indicated that additional information would be provided as regional distribution plans were developed.

There were no public comments on the Business, President's or Executive Director's reports.
